This class is fully online, but if you act like there are two classes per week it will help you to stay up-to-date with the course. You will view three films for the course, the **"Film List"** has links to the pay versions, however you may utilize other resources that you find on your own to view these videos (see Film List). In addition there will also be two major papers and two major projects. One paper will be over Contemporary Art (not Modern Art, that is an art movement), the other paper over the first film you watch during week 1. You also have the opportunity for EXTRA CREDIT, if you chose to visit to the Museum of Fine Arts Houston (MFAH). You can read about more in the MFAH extra credit reflection paper. There will be additional written and visual assignments due on Saturday and/or Sunday by 10pm. If you don't participate in the course. Saving files as a .doc or .pdf is required. This type of file opens in D2L. You will upload just one file, not multiple... so make sure you save everything together for each Paper, Project or assignment. Contact IT about getting the student version of Microsoft Office for free.

You will need to upload photos or scan images for this course. You will need a camera for this course and you will need to create .doc or .pdf with text and images in <u>ONE</u> file, no other file types will be accepted. If you upload and second file you erase your first file and I only see your last upload... so you can get rid of mistake files this way. Your discussions will have 2 parts Saturday personal post are due and by Sunday your reply to peers by 10pm. You will also have discussions over the films. Your quizzes are due on <u>Saturday</u> at 10pm. You will keep a sketchbook (blank pages, no lined notebooks) and have activities to complete, this must be turned into me at campus by week 14 (can be dropped off or mailed).

<u>To start the course, click on **"Content"** on the menu above</u>. When you do so, you may get what appears at first to be a blank white page. If you do, just scroll down until you see the course contents. Please read everything first! Print out the Syllabus, Assignment Guide, Film List and

MFAH extra credit. If you have any scheduling conflicts with the syllabus, get those sorted out right away. "I got the wrong date/time" is not an excuse, since everything is due before 10 on Saturday or Sunday add an alert to your phone! All chapters and their related discussions and quizzes are ready, and you can work at your own pace. Just don't procrastinate! The semester moves quickly and late work will only be accepted on a case by case basis. You get ONE free redo... don't waste it. This means that I recommend completing chapter reading ahead of time and not waiting until the last minute to complete discussions or assignments (since if it comes in late you won't receive credit for it). Check the syllabus weekly, this course has due dates on Saturday and/or Sunday at 10pm each week.

LATE work will NOT be accepted.
