INTRODUCTION TO CRIMINAL JUSTICE FALL 2020 ONLINE COURSE SYLLABUS

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I. Course Description.

This course provides an introduction to criminal justice in America. The primary goal of this course is to develop a general understanding of the criminal justice system and its response to crime in society today. Students will consider crime in the U.S., explore the key elements of the criminal justice system (policing, courts, and corrections), and examine a number of special issues relevant to criminal justice today.

II. Required Textbook.

Criminal Justice-A Brief Introduction, 11th or 13th Edition: Frank Schmalleger: Pearson. The 13th Edition may be purchased online. Currently, the Brazosport College Bookstore only has the 11th Edition in stock. A student of this institution is not under any obligation to purchase a textbook from the college bookstore. In addition to the textbook, students may be required to locate specific articles, videos, and reports on the Internet.

IV. Course Requirements.

Because this is an online course, students are expected to use self-discipline to pace themselves and keep current. You should be prepared to devote from 15-20 hours of work to this class per week (the equivalent of three/four hours of class time, plus the "traditional" two hours per class time of study for each unit of credit, plus three hours to answer study questions).

The course is ideally designed for the student who cannot or does not want to attend regularly scheduled on-campus classes. Students can complete course requirements while continuing to meet other responsibilities and demands. When and where you work is not important; what matters is completing the work in a timely fashion while meeting course content requirements.

V. Assignments.

The course is divided into "Weekly" assignments. Before you read the assigned chapter(s), read the "Review Questions" at the end of each chapter in the textbook weekly. When you finish the chapter, look at the "Key Terms" in each chapter. Those are major concepts you should know and be able to define.

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Questions about your readings can be raised (and will be answered) during the online Discussion Board." Feel free to ask questions. Please check the Discussion Board to be sure that others have not already raised that question and received an answer. All students have access to the Discussion Board; this is where you can best communicate with your instructor or teaching coordinator.

Remember to check the "Announcements" on a frequent basis, as it may be necessary to raise additional issues or clarify assignments. Even if you are a "flash" student intending to complete course requirements as rapidly as possible, you may need the additional information about weekly assignments.

VI. Internet Readings.

Internet readings may be required for each chapter assigned. Click on the URL to locate the assigned readings. We strongly suggest you save the readings electronically, or print them and organize them in a three-ring binder or folder. Exam questions may be derived from internet readings.

VII. Examinations.

There will be two (2) exams, a final exam, and quizzes throughout the semester.

The first exam will cover chapters 1 thru 4; the second exam will cover chapters 5 thru 8; and the final exam will cover chapters 9 thru 13. The exams will consist of multiple-choice and true-false questions. Availability dates are posted in D2L in the assignment section.

It is important you complete the scheduled examinations. Only in exceptional cases will students be permitted to take an examination late.

Any extra credit work will be in the form of a research paper. Papers will be graded on organization, content, grammar, and currency (recent sources). Observe the minimal requirements above.

IX. Student Exercises.

Exercises may be required for this course. They are to be submitted to your instructor when you finish. In your written answer, be sure to speak directly to the question and use the format indicated.

X. Grading.

The exams will account for 60% of your final grade. The quizzes will account for 20%; and the discussion questions/participation will account for 20%.
