Brazosport College Syllabus for Police Systems and Practices (*CRIJ 2328*)

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will introduce the student to the exploration of the profession of police officer. Topics include organization of law enforcement systems, the police role, police discretion, ethics, police-community interaction, and current and future issues.

PREREQUISITES

COURSE OBJECTIVES and STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Through the duration and upon conclusion of this course, the student should:

- 1. Define the role of the police in the criminal justice system.
- 2. Describe/recognize influences which led to the formation of local, state, and federal policing.
- 3. Examine how the personalities of the staff and supervisors of a police department can affect morale of a department and of the community.
- 4. Examine/describe how police crime control efforts are affected by both people in the community and the police department itself.
- 5. Describe the types of services routinely provided by police in American communities.
- 6. Define order maintenance and describe its importance as a function of the police and to define discretion and discuss its use in the maintenance of order by police.
- 7. Describe/discuss ways the characteristics of the community, the police organization, and police officers affect types and levels of police corruption.

PROJECTS, ASSIGNMENTS, PORTFOLIOS, SERVICE LEARNING, INTERNSHIPS, ETC.

Weekly attendance and participation in discussion questions will be counted as **20%** toward a student's overall grade. The instructor will post various topics for class discussion in the discussion forum each week.

Each student will be required to respond to each topic with **one** initial post to the topic and **two responses** to other students' postings. Therefore, each topic posted by the instructor will require a total of **3** responses from each student. The instructor will typically post 1 to 3 topics per week.

It is not necessary for each student to reply to EVERY post that comes in as a discussion question answer from another student!

The intent is that if students engage each other during the discussion, the discussion will become more fruitful and longer lasting.

A student's initial response to the discussion question shall be no less than **150 words** to receive full credit.

Participation responses to other students' postings shall be such that something of substance is added to the discussion. A reply consisting of "I agree" or "Good point" **does not** add substance to the discussion! **100 words** or more worth of reply to another student's posting will be considered acceptable.

Your initial post(s) to the discussion question(s) will be worth one half of your weekly discussion/participation points

Your additional responses to student and instructor posts will account for the remaining one half of your weekly discussion/participation points.

Discussions will open at 12:01 am on Day 1 of each week.

Discussions will close at 11:59 pm on Day 7 of each week so that the class may move on to another discussion topic.

There are no late submissions allowed for your discussion responses!

During the course, students will be required to complete a writing or research assignment to which the topic and due date will later be determined. The writing assignment will also account for 200 points towards a student's overall course grade.
