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Principles of Economics I

Course Description: Principles of Macroeconomics is a course designed to teach you the basic concepts and tools used for economic analysis. One of the goals of this course is to inform students who may be considering pursuing a degree in economics, and to prepare them for future coursework. The other goal is to teach you how to think like an economist, and apply economic reasoning to everyday situations. Even relatively simple economic principles can be powerful tools, and understanding them is important even for non-economists.

Course Policy

Course Objectives: Students will examine and assess how the economy of the entire country functions by describing how markets work, identifying how the economy is measured, analyzing the tools used to stimulate and slow down the economy, and evaluate the issues concerning the current state of the economy.

Readings: Readings for the course will be assigned from the O'Sullivan e-text. The e-text is available within the MyEconLab website under the link called Textbook Resources. The textbook readings will supplement the material covered in class, and you will be responsible for both.

Study Guide: A summary of each chapter, learning tips, discussions of chapter material, application, and exercises are available within the study guide. The study guide is available within the Textbook Resources of the MyEconLab website.

MyEconLab Assignments: Assignments for each chapter are available in the MyEconLab website at <u>www.myeconlab.com</u>. Assignments must be completed by the due date for full credit. Late assignments will be penalized 30 percent for a maximum score of a 70.

Quizzes: The quizzes will be given at the beginning of class. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped. There are no make-up quizzes. Students who miss a quiz will receive a zero. See the course calendar for projected quiz dates.

Exams: The three scheduled exams consist of multiple choice problems and/or workout problems. The final exam is comprehensive and replaces the student's lowest exam score. Students with an average of 90 or above on the three scheduled exams will earn exemption from the comprehensive final exam.

Missed Exams: No makeup exams will be given. Students will receive a zero for missing a scheduled exam. The date of each exam (test) is provided on the course calendar. Students may take the exam in the Learning Services prior to the scheduled date of the test.

Comprehensive Final Exam: The comprehensive final exam is worth 15 percent of a student's final grade and replaces a student's lowest test grade (15 percent). Therefore the comprehensive final exam is worth a maximum of 30 percent of the student's final course grade. Students will be allowed to use a pencil and calculator on the exam.

Study: Macroeconomics applies scientific philosophy borrowed from many other fields of study. This broadly based course may be different from any other course you have had. It requires you to think critically in a unique way. You will deal with ambiguity, rarely finding "one right" answer; often instead, dealing with possibilities in the abstract (if . . . , on the other hand . . .). You must keep up with class, reading the text, completing the assignments, and observing current events.
