## **Course Description**

This course provides a basic introduction to American Politics and government. The course will examine the institutions and processes of American government as well as political factors that influence them. We will focus our analysis on four major areas: The American System, Civil Rights and Liberties, People and Politics and Political Institutions.

## **Core Curriculum Objectives and Assessments**

As part of the Brazosport College Core Curriculum, this course provides students the opportunity to achieve the following core curriculum objectives:

1. Critical Thinking: Including innovation, creative thinking, inquiry and analysis, evaluation, and synthesis of information

2.Communication Skills: Including effective development, interpretation, and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication.

3.Social Responsibility: Including intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.

4.Personal Responsibility: Including the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision making.

Objectives will be assessed according to the Brazosport College Core Assessment Plan through the sampling and evaluation of student work

#### **Student Learning Outcomes**

The aim of this course is to make students understand structure, functioning and key concepts of American politics. At the end of the semester students are expected to have well rounded knowledge on:

- The nature of government and its theoretical foundations
- Relate American political thought to global political thought
- Identify and explain structures and functions of government prescribed by the Constitution
- Asses the relationship between individuals and the state with emphasis on political rights and liberties
- Analyze the American political process, including the development of ideologies, voting behavior and other forms of political participation.

- Evaluate the relationship between the governing process and public policy.
- Utilize the knowledge gained to become engaged with the American political process.

#### **Course Procedures**

The basic format for the course will be lecture but discussion is encouraged. Students should follow national and state political news stories on a regular basis. The student is responsible for all materials presented in class and in the textbook, including illustrations. This will be an "information intensive" subject. A variety of communication means will be used, including instructor presentation, video, assigned readings, paper assignment and quizzes. Students will be expected to engage the ideas and material through appropriate class preparation and participation. The class will discuss a variety of simple and complex questions. The students will take written examinations.

#### **Course Requirements**

#### Exams:

There will be three midterm exams (15 percent each) and one final exam (20 percent). If a student takes all 3 midterm exams, the two highest scores will be used in calculating course grade. Every student must take the final exam.

Final exam will be cumulative. The exams will be based on materials covered in class and your textbook. We will not cover every chapter line by line. It is the students' responsibility to read each chapter thoroughly and take extensive notes. The exams could be a combination of multiple choice, true-false, matching. The students must <u>download Lockdown Browser</u> to take the exams.

To take a makeup exam, the students MUST present a legal documentation for their absences and MUST inform the instructor at least 48 hours in advance, excluding emergency situations. Even emergency situations need to be documented. A hospital note, doctors note, a death announcement on a newspaper are some examples to legal documentations. A family trip, "feeling under the weather" without a doctor's note, grandparents' death without proof are some of the unacceptable examples. The students must present their documentation within 5 business days.

## Wrap it up quizzes (15 percent)

Quizzes (one per chapter) for every chapter, students must take a short quiz of multiple-choice questions that test students' knowledge of the readings. Once the student clicks on a quiz, s/he will have 25 **minutes to complete it.** So, make a good arrangement of your time. Each quiz will be available until the Sunday midnight of the week that we cover that chapter. You can find due dates for all assignments on the syllabus. If a student misses a quiz, there will not be a make-up quiz. Each quiz will ONLY be available in certain time period. If a student fails to complete a quiz in the allocated time, there will be no makeup for that week's quiz.

There will be 13 quizzes available. The lowest 3 grades will be dropped. Students will be graded over 10 quizzes.

## Watch and Consider (15 percent)

Each week students will watch a video and take a brief assessment to check their understanding. The videos will be about real life events, current political debates. There will be 13 "Watch and Consider" videos and assessments.

There will be 13 assessments available. The lowest 3 grades will be dropped. Students will be graded over 10 assessments. Each assessment will be available until the Sunday midnight of the week that we cover that chapter. You can find due dates for all assignments on the syllabus

For each assignment students only have one attempt. So, make sure you read the chapter before you start the assignments.

Note: In MindTap, you will find some more very useful assignments that can prepare you for the exams. You can study by test prep quizzes, and focus activities. These two types of assignments will not be counted towards grade. Any assignment that will be counted towards grade will have an orange ball icon under it that reads "counted towards grade.

#### Paper Assignment (15 percent)

Students expected to write a minimum 750-word paper. Students are expected to select a current political (not historical) issue or problem , a topic. Students are expected to draw personal conclusion based on their analysis of the problem or the issue by presenting evidence and comparing different viewpoints. The paper needs to be written in New Times Roman, 12 Font, double space format. Students are expected to have no typographical errors, misspelled words, and grammatical errors. In text citation as well as a

bibliography (e.g., a "work cited" or "End Notes" page) using an appropriate method approved by the Instructor is necessary.

**Submission guidelines**: All written work must be types in Times New Roman, 12pt. font, double spaced . All assignments must be submitted on time. No extensions will be allowed (with the exception of extraordinary cases in which prior instructor's consent is required at least 48 hours **before the deadline for the assignment**). Students who do not submit their work on time will be penalized. 5 points for each day they fail to submit their work. Work that is submitted three days or more after the deadline will receive a grade of zero for the assignment. The due date of assignments is **clearly marked in this syllabus** and it is **STUDENT'S RESPOSNSIBILITY** to know the due dates of the assignments.

Papers will be submitted via D2L through Dropbox.

# Attendance and Participation (5 percent)

All courses will be held on Zoom and will be recorded. The students need to attend classes from end to beginning of the course. There will be ample opportunities for discussion in our virtual classroom setting. there will be more lecturing than at others, I will make time in each session for questions and discussion. I expect that while we might all disagree on certain issues throughout the semester that all discussions will be civil, and everyone should respect each other. I expect students to treat fellow students, their instructor, as adults and with respect. No form of "hostile environment" or "harassment" will be tolerated by any student or employee

Participation grades will be determined by attendance and oral participation in class. The following are general guidelines and evaluation criteria for participation:

(A)- Exceptional contribution, characterized by being an outstanding participant and frequent contributions during discussion. The student's participation helps to generate more and better discussion within the class.

(B)Substantial contribution, characterized by meaningful involvement that added to the discussion. He or she offered provocative and relevant comments or questions and participation was relevant to the readings and class questions.

(C)Expected contribution, characterized by meaningful involvement that added to the process. He or she participated consistently but not frequently. The student showed willingness and understanding during the discussion. Comments or questions were somewhat linked to the readings and class questions.

(D)Marginal and infrequent contribution, characterized by minor involvement that added little to the discussion. The student's knowledge of the reading could be inferred but was not directly linked or stated.

(F)Insignificant contribution, characterized by a failure to display interest or make relevant comments. The student may listen the lecture but not intently and did not utilize reading material or personal experience when making comments.

If you can't attend the course you may choose to answer discussion questions that will be available each week from Friday 9.00 am- Saturday 11.59am. Your answers will be counted towards 5 percent attendance. The answers need to be a paragraph long minimum (150 words).

(NOTE: If a student stops attending class, he/she will NOT be administratively withdrawn by the instructor. It is the student's responsibility to initiate the withdrawal process before the college deadline for such action.)
