COURSE DESCRIPTION

Origin and development of the Texas constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and intergovernmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas.

COURSE OBJECTIVES (Student Learning Outcomes)

- 1. Explain the origin and development of the Texas constitution.
- 2. Describe state and local political systems and their relationship with the federal government.
- 3. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice in Texas.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of Texas government.
- 5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in Texas.
- 6. Analyze the state and local election process.
- 7. Identify the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
- 8. Analyze issues, policies and political culture of Texas.

COURSE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

QUIZZES

Regular quizzes are open-note assignments in the Virtual Campus consisting of 10 (mostly multiple-choice with an occasional true-false) questions worth one point each. There is an enforced one hour time limit for completing each quiz so you should have plenty of time to be able to look up information as needed. Quizzes are set to allow a second attempt on missed questions. *The first attempt will be used for grade purposes.* Second attempt is solely to allow you to see questions that were missed. *Late work will receive reduced credit.*

EXAMINATIONS

There will be four in-class exams and an optional comprehensive in-class final exam. If a student takes five exams, the four highest scores will be used in calculating course grade. The four regular exams are closed-note assignments consisting of 50 (mostly multiple-choice with a few true-false) questions worth two points each plus 10 bonus current event (multiple-choice) questions worth one point each. Each exam module will have a PowerPoint presentation containing current political and economic events located next to the study guide at the bottom of the module. The optional final is a closed-note exam consisting of 100 (mostly multiple-choice with a few true-false) questions worth one point each plus 10 bonus current event (multiple-choice with a not plus 10 bonus current event (multiple-choice with a few true-false) questions worth one point each plus 10 bonus current event (multiple-choice) questions worth one point each plus 10 bonus current event (multiple-choice) questions worth one point each plus 10 bonus current event (multiple-choice) questions worth one point each plus 10 bonus current event (multiple-choice) questions worth one point each plus 10 bonus current event (multiple-choice) questions worth one point each.

DISCUSSION

One of the features of the Virtual Campus is the ability to share perspectives through use of the discussions tool. There will be eight discussions to complete (two for each course module). Discussions are generally openended assignments to consider a topic most have probably not spent a lot of time thinking about. Your response does not need to be a lengthy writing exercise but it does need to demonstrate your THOUGHTFUL reflection on the topic. Some discussions are about an article or video posted in the Virtual Campus. For those discussions, you definitely need to address the information presented in the article/video before giving your personal thoughts on the topic. Demonstrate conclusively that you did in fact read the article/watch the video you are analyzing. Use of AI (Artificial Intelligence) products for discussions will result in a zero for that discussion. Late work will receive reduced credit.

Course participants should respond to one another with respect at all times. Differing viewpoints are likely to be expressed and are welcome as long as each posting is stated in appropriate, respectful language. If you

disagree with an idea stated in a classmate's posting, your response should focus on the substance of the idea without attacking or insulting the person who expressed the thought you take issue with. In short, we should be able to disagree without being disagreeable.

GRAMMAR

This is an academic course at an institution of higher education. Ensure that all written course communications (including email) are grammatically correct. This includes but is not limited to capitalization, punctuation, sentence structure and spelling. Do not write discussions in a style like you are texting a friend. You should be communicating with your instructor and fellow classmates in a professional manner. **Discussions should be approached as if you are writing a document for management at work.**
