GOVT 2306 Texas Government - CIP 4510025125 A functional study of the origin and development of the Texas Constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and inter-governmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas.

There is no required textbook for this course. This is an online course using the Desire2Learn (D2L) class management system. Course content will be presented in the Unit Modules found in D2L *Content*. Each module will contain Power Point presentations. Power Point presentations will contain narration by the instructor and will require a device with speakers or a headset. To hear the audio for each Power Point presentation click on "Slide Show" and then click on "From Beginning" and the presentation will automatically move from slide to slide with the narration. All class assignments will be submitted online.

Ideas for Becoming a More Successful Student

- Read this syllabus carefully.
- Make sure you thoroughly understand the requirements of the course and what will be expected of you. Ask questions about anything you do not understand.
- Become an active learner. Be an active reader, writer, and listener.
- Use the discussion board to become an active questioner. If you do not ask questions, you will probably not discover what you do not know.
- Spend time in the "online environment" in D2L. Don't sit back passively, waiting for knowledge to fall into your head like rain into a rain barrel. It won't.
- Relate content whenever possible to issues and problems and practical situations in your life.
- Figure out what study and learning skills you are not good at. Practice those skills whenever possible. Recognizing and correcting your weaknesses is a strength.

- Frequently ask yourself: "Can I explain this to someone not in this course?" If not, you haven't learned it well enough.
- Write summaries in your own words of important points from the power points and other sources in the modules. Make up test questions. Write out answers to your own questions.
- Frequently evaluate your reading and listening as you view the power points. Are you reading and listening actively? Are you asking questions as you read and listen? Can you distinguish what you understand from what you don't?

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Introductions and Profile

The first assignment is to post a brief self-introduction and profile. In your introduction address the following questions. (1) What are your education and/or career goals? (5) If you have taken an online course before what advice would you offer about being successful in online courses?

Exams

- There will be four exams and a final exam. All exams will be completed online using D2L.
- Each exam will consist of a set of multiple-choice and true/false items drawn from the Power Points and other sources found in D2L *Content*.
- Late exams are penalized 10 points per day.
- Once you have completed and submitted an exam you will be able to view your grade in the D2L Grades tool.

Essays

• Essays should be carefully written and demonstrate a knowledge and understanding of the topic. Each essay will have an attached grading rubric which will give you detailed criteria on how the essay will be graded and scored. Check the Dropbox for essay topics and due dates. Essays are scored on content and style. The course glossary contains some commonly misused or misspelled words.

Discussion Board

- The Discussion Board is an open forum. In this forum we may see a continuation of the topics discussed in the essays. Issues that develop in the news during the time of our course may also be topics of discussion. You are welcome to raise and present topics for discussion. The Discussion Board allows for replies to the postings of your classmates. In responding to a classmate's post it is fine to share your opinions. Remember to keep your comments civil and respectful.
- Posts to the discussion board should be in complete sentences with careful attention to spelling and grammar standards. Proof read discussion posts just as carefully as you would any formal written assignment.
