COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course examines US History from the European exploration of the New World in the 16th century to the Civil War and Reconstruction. Throughout this course, students will analyze important people and events that helped shape the United States of America into the country that it is today.

I. **PREREQUISITES:** College level reading and writing skills.

III. LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Create an argument through the use of historical evidence.
- 2. Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources.
- 3. Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on this period of United States history.

IV. COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND ASSIGNMENTS

- A. Lectures, Video Presentations, Textbook Readings, etc.
- B. Quizzes/Exams/Classroom Discussions/Research Assignments

Discussions: Students will be expected to have read the chapter(s) and other assigned material for the week in order to effectively participate in classroom discussions and successfully complete quizzes and exams.

Quizzes: Students will complete weekly InQuizitive quizzes over the material covered in each chapter.

Exams: Exams may consist of short answer, multiple choice, true/false questions and essay prompts. Short answer questions require a three to five sentence response, not a simple one-word answer. Essay prompt responses require a structured multiple-paragraph essay, not just a few sentences. The final exam will consist of true/false and multiple choice questions and may be over information covered throughout the entire course.

Note: Students are NOT allowed to use electronic devices during exams. Possession of any electronic device during exams is considered cheating and will result in a zero, as well as additional disciplinary actions. All exams must be completed during the class period they are assigned. Once a student begins an exam, he or she must finish it completely; students will not be allowed to finish exams later or on another day.

Short Research Assignments: Students will be assigned primary documents from *Eyewitness to America* and required to complete a short written research assignment for each assigned document. Each assignment may require students to locate and use both primary and secondary sources in addition to the course textbook. Students need to refer to the assignment information and rubric for more details on the expectations and requirements of each written assignment. All sources used for written assignments MUST be cited in Chicago/Turabian Notes/Bibliography style.

Students are always welcome to seek help from the instructor at any time for assistance with correctly citing sources. However, students should allow enough time to complete these research assignments and should not wait until the very last minute to complete the assignment, as that will not allow enough time to seek help from the instructor concerning questions about the assignment.
