This is an introductory philosophy course emphasizing various approaches to the study and organization of the world and its phenomena. We will survey many philosophical systems, and historical approaches to solving some of the most important problems regarding society, life, liberty, and humanity.

Course Materials

Approved Textbook: *The Great Conversation,* Norman Melchert & David Morrow. Oxford University Press. ISBN: 978-0-19-016-4959 (9th edition)

- Course materials (syllabus, some required readings, lectures and resources) will be available in the Content area of Virtual Campus. Students must obtain a textbook on their own.
- Procedure: This course is offered as an INTERNET course. We will combine an examination of major historical figures and their methods with an equal portion of analyzing and writing on the topics. The assignment questions are designed to highlight connections between the requisite textbook readings, the "Essential Points" lecture outlines, and ideas that might arise concerning a particular topic. You may draw upon personal experience when composing responses to any assignment prompts. The course material will be accessible at Virtual Campus, Brazosport College's Learning Management System. As soon as you are registered for the course and the course actually begins, you should be able to access course materials. After logging in, click on the

- course link and go to its home page. You will find links to assignments, Virtual Campus lectures to accompany the readings for the course, and quizzes. It is required that you have a textbook.
- Required course materials are available at the Brazosport College bookstore, on campus or online at http://www.brazosport.edu/bookstore. A student of this institution is not under any obligation to purchase a textbook from the college bookstore. The same textbook is/may also be available from an independent retailer, including an online retailer.
- Office Hours: Instructor will be available to students via Zoom, Facetime or audio call, by appointment.

- **Practice Quizzes:** take the practice quizzes in the units that offer them.
- Assignments: make sure that you stay strictly within the length guidelines.

Course Overview & Structure

This is a web-based course delivered through the Virtual Campus portal at Brazosport College. This class runs on a 24/7 weekly schedule. This means that within any given week you are free to choose your own times to learn and participate. Discussions and submission of assignments will occur every week on Sunday, and in some cases during the week. Because you are not entirely on a fixed schedule **it is up to you** to develop the discipline and schedule the time to be an active learner in this environment. **You must turn in work by the due dates**, but you are welcomed to work ahead, and to budget your time according to your needs.

ALL materials (course and reference), communication and testing tools will be available online. You are **REQUIRED** to access the course at LEAST once a day to check for any course updates.

There are 15 weeks in the semester, and they are broken into various units. Each unit contains a checklist noting activities which might include: discussion and dropbox requirements, essential points lectures, chapter quizzes or practice quizzes, reading/study questions, PowerPoint slideshows, and occasionally, outside resources.

Assignments: Assignments are short written compositions that involve responses to the readings. These are private responses between you and your instructor. You may be prompted to respond to the readings in various ways and to make connections between the text and any films, videos, or other materials used for the course. Please **strictly** limit yourself to the length requirements for any written submission. This will challenge you to sharpen your writing skills, and will allow the instructor to better manage her time in grading your submissions.

Things to double-check before submitting assignments: word count, grammar, spell check, make sure all the questions in the prompt have been addressed, cite sources used if other than the course textbook, make sure to keep a backup copy of the submission.



Discussions: Discussion forums allow students to interact with their peers, working to answer questions pertinent to the topic. It is expected that all participants will treat others with diplomacy & respect, and it is understood that if the instructor removes a post or comment due to inappropriate language or behaviour, then the points will be sacrificed by the offender. In order to be eligible for an "A", students must make at least one post, and comment meaningfully on at least two of their peers' posts. An alternative assignment will sometimes be provided for anyone who does not participate in a discussion by its due date; the maximum score you can receive on this alternative assignment will be 70%. Discussions can't happen without participation!

Essay: At least one short essay assignment is required for the course, and will be identified as "Essay Assignment" in the dropbox. If you quote from sources, document your source, whether it is the primary source (the textbook) or a secondary source. Do not borrow material from study guides, Wikipedia, SparkNotes or other such online resources. Do your own thinking. Proofread your essay for errors in grammar, spelling and punctuation.

Quizzes: Some chapters will contain an assessment which is designed to ensure that one has completed the assigned reading. The assessment will cover the most important ideas presented in the chapter reading, the "*Essential Points*", the Power Point slideshows, and the practice quizzes, where applicable.

<u>Practice Quizzes</u>: Most chapters will contain practice quizzes. These assessments are intended to help the student internalize the unit's most important ideas. These quizzes do not calculate into the course grade, and are available to be re-taken as many times as the student would like to do until s/he feels the content has been mastered.

Optional Unit: Sometime during the semester an "optional" unit *may* be offered. This optional unit is accompanied by a quiz. The grade on this optional quiz may be used to replace a lower quiz score from earlier in the session.

<u>Final Exam</u>: The final exam will be cumulative and will include questions over material covered in the course. There will be a list of *Review Questions* and a discussion forum to help you prepare for the final exam, and these materials will become available later in the course. Participation in the *Review Discussion Forum* is required.

Communication

Communication will take place using various interactive tools (Discussions, Email, Dropbox)

<u>Instructor Response Times</u>

I will respond to critical questions within 24-48 hours. I will be responding to regular discussion posts and email messages at least once daily, very early in the mornings, or late in the afternoons. Feel free to text me, should you require a response more quickly. If 72 hours has passed and you have not received feedback or a response from me, please alert me, for I have somehow missed your message or submission.



Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, the student will be able to identify fundamental ideas of thinkers such as the Pre-Socratics, Socrates, Plato, Aristotle, Anselm, the Stoics, and Empiricists. The student will understand the significance of the great "conversation" which is the history of philosophical thought. The student will have gained insight into his/her own highest values and most dearly held beliefs. The student will be able to identify a False Dichotomy and will be able to competently discuss the Ontological Argument.

Course Policies

<u>Late Work Policy</u>: It is expected that work will be completed on time, and submitted by the due dates. Late work will be accepted, but penalized, save for documentable extenuating circumstances. Late work will be penalized by ten points for each week it is late, with a maximum deduction of forty points. Any late work submitted after **Nov 30**th will receive a maximum score of sixty percent, no matter when it was due.

Assignments will be due on the due date by 11:59 PM (most of the assignments will be due on Sunday evenings, with only the exceptions of a handful of assignments at the start and at the end of the course). Some assignments might be graded on the basis of "timely submission", meaning that IF the assignment was turned in on time, AND IF the assignment meets criteria, THEN the submission receives a "100" score. These assignments may not be given personalized feedback by the instructor, and late submissions will be graded "as-is" and will receive a penalty deduction in points. The student will not know ahead of time which assignments will be graded on "timely submission", so it is strongly recommended that one turn in all assignments on time.

Another benefit of turning work in on-time is that re-writes are offered in order to achieve a higher score. If the work is late, then it will be graded "as-is".
