- 4.) Predict the impact of internal and external influences on long-term behaviors and mental processes
- 5.) Form conclusions regarding how/why you have formed behaviors and mental processes that differ from other members of society
- 6.) Identify categories of mental health disorders and explain the interaction of biopsychosocial factors influencing mental health
- 7.) Relate and apply the above objectives to real-life situations and dilemma

COURSE STRUCTURE

This course will require active participation. The structure will be such that you will prepare by doing reading, Achieve assignments, and watching recorded lectures on your own time, and we will work more actively with the course material doing in-class discussion and activities during class time. You are responsible for reading all appropriate chapters and completing assignments and quizzes **before** the material is discussed in class. It is important that you stay ahead and keep track of all assignments and deadlines. Come to class prepared to participate, with assignments completed when required. Follow the course timeline to stay on track.

Much of this class will be completed in a team-based learning format. You will be assigned to teams of approximately 4-5 students and complete assignments and quizzes together in class. You will be assigned to one team for the first half of the class and a different team for the second half. I will expect you to participate regularly and contribute to overall class discussion, team discussions, and team assignments. I will grade you on participation at midterm and at the end of the semester. You will also receive grades from your peers for your contributions, so it's important to attend and participate actively in regular teamwork. Review the section on Attendance and Withdrawal policies so you know what to do in case you need to miss a class.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

It is your responsibility to keep track of all assignments and deadlines as outlined in the timeline. Your final grade will be weighted based on the following categories.

Achieve activities (20%):

You must secure access to Achieve via an access code or by purchasing access through the site. Most of your daily homework assignments will be on Achieve, and this will likely be the most time-consuming portion of the course outside of class time. This will be a combination of video activities, quizzes, and concept checks. The purpose of these activities is to ensure you have familiarized yourself with the course content to ensure you are prepared to participate in class discussion. You will earn points based on the completion of activities as well as correct answers (many of the tools allow you to complete multiple attempts). You will earn a separate grade for each chapter's activities. **The system will not accept late work.**

Online & In-class Assignments (10%)

Online Assignments: These assignments will be completed via Virtual Campus and may be in the form of Dropbox assignments or online discussion forums. You must complete assignments *by the stated deadline for your course section* in order to receive credit. For dropbox assignments, all documents *must* be uploaded in either .rtf, .docx, or .pdf format to be graded. *I encourage you to review your submissions to ensure the proper file was uploaded. Any blank files, corrupt files, or files unable to be opened from within the Virtual Campus system will receive a grade of zero.* **No make-up assignments will be allowed.**

In-class Assignments: These assignments will be completed in class. They may take on different forms, such as making a presentation to the class, completing a worksheet, doing/presenting research, or some other activity. In some cases, I may ask you to submit your assignment online for grading purposes, in which case all the above from "Online Assignments" applies. You must be present to earn credit unless you have made alternate arrangements with me.

Team Chapter Quizzes (5%):

You will also 10 multiple-choice chapter quizzes (one per chapter) in teams in class. When completing team quizzes, you should discuss each question with your team and decide on one answer for each question. I will provide immediate feedback. If you select an incorrect response, you may attempt the question again for partial credit. More information about scoring will be discussed in class. If you are late or absent for a team quiz, you will not receive credit unless you have made prior arrangements with me. **No make-up quizzes will be allowed.**

Team Assignments (20%):

You will complete 10 team assignments (one per chapter) in class. Questions on team assignments may be a combination of multiple choice, fill in the blank, and/or short answer items. You should discuss each question with your teammates and agree upon an answer for submission. Only those team members present and actively participating on the day the assignment is completed will receive credit for the assignment. If you are late, you will not receive credit for any portions completed before you arrive; if you are absent, you will not receive credit unless you have made prior arrangements with me to complete the assignment on your own. **No make-up assignments will be allowed.**

Exams (16%)

There will be four total exams (Exam 1, Exam 2, Exam 3, and the Final Exam). The three major exams will each cover 3-4 chapters and contain approximately 3-6 short answer questions, covering information from both class discussion and the textbook.

In-class exams: I will provide short answer sheets. You are allowed one standard-sized index card of handwritten notes.

Final exam: The final exam will be a comprehensive essay (detailed instructions available in Virtual Campus). All essays should be submitted to the Dropbox in either .docx, .rtf, or .pdf file format. *I encourage you to review your submissions to ensure you uploaded the proper file. Any blank files, corrupt files, or files I cannot open from within Virtual Campus will receive a grade of zero.* Late submissions allowed up to 24 hours past the deadline with a significant penalty.

No make-up exams will be given. There will be an opportunity to be exempt from the final exam essay based on your performance on the first three exams.

Personal Essays (8%):

There will be four personal essay deadlines—you will select **two** prompts of your choice to submit via the Virtual Campus Assignment Dropbox. You must select one from the first half (Essay 1 or Essay 2, with options from chapters 1-5) and one from the second half of class (Essay 3 or Essay 4, with options from chapters 6-10). Essay prompts will require you to take a more in-depth/personal look into the course content. Your essays should correctly reference relevant course content and be at least 500 words, in essay format (paragraphs) with grammatically correct full sentences, proper introductions, transitions, and conclusions. All essays should be submitted to the Dropbox in either .docx, .rtf, or .pdf file format. *I encourage you to review your submissions to ensure you uploaded the proper file. Any blank files, corrupt files, or files I cannot open from within Virtual Campus will receive a grade of zero.* **No make-up essays will be allowed.**

Peer Review (5%):

You and your team members will grade each other on your contributions to teamwork throughout the semester. Peer review grades will be collected twice (once halfway through the course and once at the end of the course). I'll provide more detailed information regarding peer review grades at that time.

Instructor Evaluation – including participation and attendance (5%):

You will receive a score from me based on my perception of your overall participation during class discussion and teamwork. You will have the opportunity to earn points from me by participating actively in class. This includes but is not limited to asking relevant questions, answering questions, making relevant comments, and sharing additional research/resources such as videos and articles relevant to course discussions.

Final Reflective Essay (7%):

This essay will be completed toward the end of the semester. It will ask you to reflect on what you learned throughout the course and how your attitudes/opinions might have changed. More information will be presented in class and in Virtual Campus. Your essay should correctly reference relevant course content and be at least 500 words, in essay format (paragraphs) with grammatically correct full sentences, proper introductions, transitions, and conclusions. All essays should be submitted to the Dropbox in either .docx, .rtf, or .pdf file format. *I encourage you to review your submissions to ensure you uploaded the proper file. Any blank files, corrupt files, or files I cannot open from within Virtual Campus will receive a grade of zero.* Late submissions allowed up to 24 hours past the deadline with a significant penalty.

Checkpoint Discussions (4%)

There will be four separate checkpoints in the Discussions area of Virtual Campus. These are intended as benchmarks for you to assess your understanding of the four psychological research perspectives and serve as a means for you to begin work on comprehensive papers, so you are not overwhelmed by them at the end of the semester. You will receive a grade of 1 or 0 based solely on whether you posted or not. I will not assess correctness, detail, or quality for these posts as these are simply intended to serve as practice. **No late or make-up posts will be accepted.**

Optional Extra Credit Project (Up to 5 points):

To complete this project, you should take any concept or theory of interest and apply it to your life in some meaningful way (observations, changes, analyses, etc.). You will create a 3-5 minute video (fully edited video, PowerPoint with voiceover, or simple oral format). More detailed information regarding the project will be distributed in the Virtual Campus Content section. **No late extra credit accepted.**

MAKE-UP POLICY

Absolutely **no make-ups** will be accepted for any missed component of the course. If you need an extension for any reason, you must contact me in advance. The optional extra credit project to help offset any missed assignments. I may decide to drop other course components at my discretion.

I do not allow any corrections or resubmissions after assignments have been graded.

<u> "LIFE HAPPENS" CLAUSE</u>

I understand that life happens, and occasionally, I make exceptions to certain course policies and deadlines due to extenuating circumstances. Generally, I prefer to make policy changes that benefit the entire class, but if you are facing a personal hardship and would like to request an individual accommodation, you can do so by detailing your issues and requests in an email. You must contact me as soon as possible **before deadlines have passed** for me to consider making any exceptions or changes. **I cannot make exceptions after deadlines have passed** except in extreme circumstances. Exceptions are made on a case-by-case basis at my discretion.

INSTRUCTOR RESPONSIBILITIES

I will make every attempt to provide feedback and grades in a timely manner for all assignments, exams, discussions, essays, and any other required course components. I am generally able to get grades back within 1-2 weeks, but during busy times of the semester, some grading may be delayed. I will attempt to respond to emails in a timely manner (normally within *1 weekday*). You can expect most grading and email correspondence to occur on days I am scheduled to be in the office, but I do work on weekends and random hours as well. It is important to work ahead in case any issues arise so they can be taken care of during "normal" business hours. You should not automatically expect me to be available late at night, on holidays, or on weekends.

STUDENT COMMUNICATION

You may communicate with me using several different avenues (email, phone, internal Virtual Campus message, etc.—see the Welcome news post in Virtual Campus for more detailed information). When communicating with me, you **must**:

- Indicate full name and *specific* course information
- Use proper etiquette, spelling, and grammar
- Ask *specific* questions
- Only ask questions if the answer cannot be found in the syllabus

When communicating with other students via discussions or any other methods, you should be sure to use proper spelling and grammar and be courteous and considerate.

ATTENDANCE AND WITHDRAWAL POLICIES

You have committed to our regularly scheduled meetings, and I expect you to attend every class on time. Pay careful attention to the course timeline to prepare for meetings in advance. Please do not attend class if you are sick, especially on a teamwork day. If you must be absent due to illness, contact me in advance to make arrangements. I won't penalize you for missing one or two regular discussion days, but if you don't attend on a day when teamwork or a graded activity is scheduled and don't contact me in advance to make arrangements, you will receive a grade of zero for that day's work. If you make a habit of skipping classes regularly, this will affect your overall participation grade.

Your team members will keep track of attendance on days that teamwork is completed—you cannot earn credit for teamwork if you are not present. If you absolutely must miss a class for a documentable reason, email me as soon as possible to make arrangements *before the missed class*.

In addition to our regularly scheduled meetings, I expect you to log in to Virtual Campus and Achieve *at least* once a week. You are responsible for all information presented in Virtual Campus, whether you access it or not. Logins are not recorded for credit.

I will **not** initiate any administrative withdrawals, regardless of your attendance or progress. <u>It is</u> <u>your responsibility to initiate any drops or withdrawals if you feel it is in your best interest.</u> You are responsible for knowing the withdrawal date and procedures. No grade changes will be issued once final grades are submitted to the Registrar unless I have made an error.

ACADEMIC HONESTY

You should not submit as your own any work that is generated with the help of artificial intelligence or purchased from any other person or website.

AI Policy Related to Academic Honesty: I am aware that it is practically impossible to fully avoid artificial intelligence (AI) as it becomes more integrated into our digital lives. I understand and expect that you may use AI tools such as spelling and grammar correction, predictive text, or synonym finders; however, you should use these tools ethically and responsibly. I ask that you specify in your submission any AI tools you used in your work. You are **not** allowed to simply prompt ChatGPT or other AI software to create content for you (unless it is explicitly part of an assignment's instructions), and you are **not** allowed to use AI software to complete exams. In this class, up to 15% of any individual paper may contain AI-generated work as long as it is properly cited in APA format. Anything else will be treated as plagiarism.

I reserve the right to assign a final grade of F or adjust other grading policies (such as rescinding a dropped exam grade and/or not allowing extra credit) as a result of academic dishonesty.

GUIDELINES FOR COMMON TECHNICAL ISSUES

Here are some general guidelines for what I anticipate as common issues:
