Also in this course you'll . . .practice being a savvy consumer of the statistics bandied about in the news; compare Japanese and U.S. attitudes toward education; realize that in surprising ways, crime is functional for society; discuss whether poverty is inevitable and if the mushrooming world population spells a catastrophe in the making. This course will introduce you to the sociological perspective on all these topics—the list is endless and your curiosity is crucial.

In fact, once you've acquired it, the sociological perspective is yours forever and will bring you special insight into your other studies as well as your life. I hope you enjoy it as much as I have.
