COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Speech 1315, fundamentals of speech, is a college course that introduces the beginning speech student to the principles of the communication process, listening skills, public speaking, including preparing, researching, organizing, and delivering speeches to the class.

COURSE GOALS:

- 1. To understand the communication process and how it affects understanding and misunderstanding
- 2. To build self-confidence by learning to prepare, evaluate, and practice public speaking skills
- 3. To improve listening skills
- 4. To develop, research, organize, and deliver ideas in a clear and interesting manner

LEARNING OUTCOMES FOR SPEECH

Demonstrate the ability to effectively communicate orally in a formal manner using clear, coherent, and engaging language appropriate to the specific purpose, the central idea and the audience.

Demonstrate competency in listening at college level, analyzing and interpreting verbal and nonverbal communication, and responding appropriately.

Demonstrate competency in the speech writing process by germinating, developing, researching, organizing, and properly documenting a speech and the sources used in speech preparation

Demonstrate logical reasoning and critical thinking skills in problem solving and developing, evaluating and presenting oral arguments.

All speeches, regardless of topic or length, must meet the following requirements:

1) Topics must be approved in advance.

2) Students must bring a **typed copy of the outline** to use while presenting. No manuscripts will be allowed at the speaker stand. The graded outline must be submitted online. You must submit an outline to speak.

3) Speeches must be within the time limits. Speeches that go under or over the time limit will face a point reduction equivalent to a letter grade. The best way to be certain that your speech goes the necessary length is to practice it several times. You will be given a 20 second grace period in either direction.

4) You have certain obligations as a speaker, but you also have certain obligations as a listener. As such, distracting the speaker will result in a deduction to your own speech grade, to be determined by me. Entering during a speech, allowing your cell phone to ring during a speech, and other inconsiderate behavior may result in as much as a letter-grade deduction to your speech.

5) You will be allowed one make up speech to be given at the end of the semester. This is not a "do over." Sometimes emergencies happen and you can not be in class on the night of presentations. You will be given an opportunity to give the speech for a reduced grade—one letter grade penalty.
